don't know about you, but I find it notable that in the timeline of the world's creation, God first made animals before creating mankind. I like to think that God wanted to ensure that when man was placed in the garden, he would enjoy the loving and unconditional companionship of living creatures.

Join Habitat Build in Fort Worth

hite's Chapel is once again joining forces with Trinity Habitat for Humanity to help bring a new home to life in the Garden Springs development of southwest Fort Worth. Two build days are scheduled for Saturday, October 11 and Saturday, October 25, with work running from 7:30 a.m. until 1 p.m. Volunteers are asked to arrive a little early for opening remarks, prayer, and a safety briefing.

The church is seeking at least 24 volunteers for each Saturday. Participants must be at least 16 years old, and while youth under 18 may not use power tools, they are still able to take part in the build. No prior construction experience is needed, as all tasks are

Panel Presentation

The Power of God in Prison

Wednesday, Oct. 22 | 6 to 8 p.m. | Grace Chapel

"I was in prison and you came to visit me." — Matthew 25:36b

e have talked a lot recently about White's Chapel's developing Prison Ministry. This ministry is one of the most direct ways to live out Jesus' command to serve "the least of these." Yet for many, the idea of stepping into a prison—or even knowing how to begin—can feel overwhelming.

On Wednesday, October 22, White's Chapel will host a special evening panel discussion on The Power of God in Prison. Representatives from nationally recognized prison ministries will share stories of how Christ's love is transforming lives behind bars.

The evening will also include a moving testimony from a victim's family, as well

as the firsthand perspective of a returned citizen who is now bringing Christ to others through his own experiences.

Together, these voices will help answer pressing questions including:

- Does prison ministry really make an impact on offenders?
- How can the church support the families of prisoners?
- What are tangible ways to get started in this work?

Following the panel, attendees will have an opportunity to ask questions and learn more about the ways White's Chapel is already serving in local correctional facilities.

ave you ever wished you could hear the Gospels in a way that makes them come alive—fresh, relevant, and deeply personal? This October, White's Chapel is honored to host internationally respected author, psychologist, and spiritual teacher **Alexander John Shaia** for a weekend of spiritual formation that promises both wisdom and inspiration.

Dr. Shaia is best known for his groundbreaking book *Heart and Mind: The Four-Gospel Journey for Radical Transformation*. In it, he invites readers to see Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John not as four competing accounts, but as four stages of a single journey. Together, these Gospel paths form a map that can guide us through the challenges, struggles, joys, and service of life. His teaching resonates across denominational lines because it offers more than theology—it offers a lived pattern of transformation that speaks into the very real circumstances we all face.



led by trained Habitat supervisors.
Under their direction, volunteers—often working alongside the family who will one day call the house their home—will help with essential steps such as raising walls, installing windows and tornado fortifications, and putting up siding.

Registration for the October build days are open on the White's Chapel website. Early sign-ups are encouraged to assist with construction scheduling. Once registered, volunteers will receive an email with the exact address, instructions on what to bring and wear, and a liability waiver to complete. Those needing transportation may ride the church bus, which will depart from the Concourse Welcome Doors in the back parking lot at 6:30 a.m.



One of the ways in which we do this is through our communion offerings, and this month is no exception. Communion offerings for the month of October will be dedicated to the Community Storehouse.

Rising food insecurity is an expanding community

challenge. It is a challenge that continues to be a critical issue affecting one in five children and impacting thousands of families in our community. Since the effects of COVID-19 in 2020 the demand for food assistance and essential personal items has skyrocketed. Requests for support have grown from 25 families per week in 2020 to approximately 208 families per week in 2024 — a staggering 729% increase.

This dramatic rise underscores the urgent need for food donation programs, community food pantries, and local hunger relief efforts to ensure that children and families have access to nutritious meals and basic necessities. Our donations help join in this fight against hunger and make a lasting impact in our community.

To close the gap between opportunity and achievement, the community storehouse is one of several programs that provides what they call 'a snack

pack program' –a consistent plan to provide nutritious, kid friendly food to children facing weekend food insecurity.

These essential snack packs ensure that students have access to healthy food even when school meals are unavailable.

> Each week, volunteers at the Community Storehouse Nutritional Center assemble and deliver snack packs to school partners where teachers and counselors identify students who may

not have food over the weekend. These snack packs are then discreetly placed in their backpacks every Friday, ensuring they have the nutrition they need to thrive.

In 2024 the Community Storehouse distributed 85,637 snack packs to local schools, providing 175,374 individual snacks. This means hundreds of children were served weekly.

Additionally, many families facing economic hardships struggle to afford daily necessities which can impact health, confidence and academic success for children. The Community Storehouse provides toothbrushes, toothpaste, shampoo, combs, soap, deodorant and personal products for distribution as needed.

Every month, 100% of the money collected in our communion offerings is dedicated to the chosen recipient. It is hoped that you will consider this as you plan your donation.

Raised in a Lebanese Maronite Catholic family in Alabama, Dr. Shaia grew up surrounded by faith and tradition. His studies took him from anthropology at the University of Notre Dame to advanced degrees in counseling, religious education, and clinical psychology. Along the way he became one of the first Americans trained in Sandplay therapy, studied under Jungian analysts, and blended psychology with spiritual practice in a way that continues

to touch lives worldwide. Today he divides his time between New Mexico and Spain, writing, leading retreats, and offering teaching that bridges ancient wisdom with

contemporary life. "This event takes us deeper into our

knowledge and application of the Gospels," said Rev. Victor Resendiz. "The Gospels highlight many spiritual practices that strengthen our faith walk and spiritual formation."

At White's Chapel, Dr. Shaia's teaching will be both practical and inspiring. The weekend begins on Friday, October 17, from 6:00 to 8:30 p.m. with a shared dinner, followed by his first session of teaching and conversation. Participants will not only hear the history and context of the Gospels but also begin to see how these ancient stories can illuminate our own life journeys. The conversation continues Saturday morning, October 18, from 9:30 a.m. until noon, when Dr. Shaia will guide us deeper into the Four-Gospel Journey. Over a light continental breakfast, he will weave together Scripture, psychology, and lived experience to show how the Gospels can nurture joy, courage, resilience, and service in our daily walk of faith.

Those who already own Heart and Mind: The Four-Gospel Journey for

Radical Transformation are encouraged to bring their copy with them. For anyone who doesn't, books will be available for purchase at the event. We also recommend bringing a pen or journal for notes and reflections during the two-day gathering, so that participants can carry home not only what they've heard but also their own insights and inspirations.

"This event is for anyone who wants to deepen their experience in the Gospels and learn about the history, theology, and the application of Jesus' teachings," added Resendiz. "The event is open to

everyone. I believe that couples can benefit from this event by learning together and sharing with one another what they received from the lectures."

Best-selling author and speaker Rob Bell has described Shaia's teaching

with words that capture the heart of this experience: "You won't read the gospels the same way ever again. You won't think about your life the same way ever again. Anthropology, psychology, the hero's journey. The Bible: fear, struggle, hope, bravery, anticipation, euphoria, return—it's all here in this masterful work."

The event will take place in the Foundry, and cost for the weekend is \$50 per person. Cost includes Friday's dinner and Saturday's continental breakfast. Space is limited, and early registration is encouraged.

Now, I don't know about you, but if I ever hit 19 on a hole (and I've been

close), I'd quit golf, sell my clubs, and take up birdwatching. But here's what struck me. For Daly, that meltdown wasn't the end of his round. He didn't throw his clubs into the pond (though I'm sure he considered it). He didn't walk off the course. He finished. Badly, yes... but he finished.

There's something gospel-shaped in that. Because if

we're honest, life is filled with "19-Stroke Holes." Days where everything unravels, where we can't get it together, and the scoreboard is embarrassing. Maybe

you've had a marriage moment, a parenting moment, a career moment that felt like Daly's hole - one mishit compounding another, until you wondered if you'd ever crawl out.

Here's the good news: the Christian life isn't scored like golf. Jesus doesn't hand

you a scorecard and shake his head when He sees all the snowmen (that's golf slang for 8's, but in Daly's case, it would be... well, a snow village). No, grace keeps no record of wrongs. Grace celebrates that you showed up, swung again, and trusted that the round isn't over yet.

So maybe you're in a hole right now. Keep swinging. Keep walking. The God

who loves you isn't tallying your strokes... He's walking beside you to the next tee. And He's already promised that, in the end, you win!




