hile our state pride shines bright all year long, during the State Fair of Texas it couldn't be more colorful!

From early September to October, the prairie sky is ablaze with tradition, celebration, and all things Texas! For any homegrown Texan, the State Fair is by far a bucket list destination.

Starting in 1886, the State Fair has held its place deep in the heart of Texas, at the historic Fair Park in Dallas. Beginning on the last Friday in September, it typically runs for 25 days.



There is so much to see and do at the Texas State Fair! This fair not only brings people from every corner of the state together, but it also serves

as an exciting opportunity to engage with other fairgoers face-to-face. From cute barnyard animals to late-night music concerts, there is something for every member of the family.

Here are a few things to be sure to check out on your visit to the Fair this year:

In Texas, big is the way of life, and there's only one way to start a visit to the State Fair: by meeting Big Tex. He's the myth, the legend, and the official greeter of the fair—the world's tallest cowboy. Since 1952, this 95-gallon hatwearing icon has stood big and tall. At a towering 38 feet tall, Big Tex wears size-96 Lucchese boots, a custom Western shirt crafted by Fort Worth's Williamson-Dickie Mfg. Co. and sports a friendly smile full of pride and Southern charm. He has welcomed millions of guests to Fair Park's annual event. Make sure to

Remembering the Saints

Wednesday following All Saints Day in the Sanctuary

ach November, the Church pauses to remember. It's a sacred rhythm that arrives with the turning of the season—when autumn leaves begin to fall and the light softens into gold. It's a season of remembrance; ,a time to honor those who have gone before us in faith and to celebrate the eternal bond that still connects us all.

All Saints' Day is not only about grief—it is also about gratitude.

All Saints' Day has been observed by Christians for more than twelve centuries. In the earliest days of the Church, believers gathered to remember the martyrs—those who gave their lives rather than deny their faith. Over time, the observance grew to include all faithful believers—every mother, father, friend, teacher, and servant of the Church whose life reflected the love and grace of Christ.

By the ninth century, Pope Gregory IV established November 1 as the official feast of *All Saints*. The day became a cherished part of the Christian calendar, reminding believers that the Church

Then there was Hal.





His books were stacked in front of him like surgical instruments. He was probably mid-50s, dressed like he'd just walked out of a Brooks Brothers catalog, and he sat in the back with his notepad, eagerly awaiting Dr. Campbell's lecture. When it was his turn, he said, "Hi, I'm Hal. I'm a surgeon in Dallas."

Now, that was technically true. But as it turns out, Hal wasn't just a surgeon- he was one of the top hip surgeons in the country. He'd had a decorated career, was known in medical circles across the nation, and had even operated on some major celebrities (though he wouldn't ever tell us who).

Well I remember learning all of this about Hal and thinking: What in the world is this guy doing here? Why would a world-class surgeon spend his Tuesday and Thursday nights listening to lectures on the Council of Nicaea and writing reflection papers on the Desert Fathers? He didn't need the degree. He didn't need the credit hours. And I didn't get the sense that he intended to change careers. It didn't make sense to me.

And apparently, I wasn't the only one wondering.

One day, a friend of mine was getting coffee between classes and decided to

just ask him point-blank. He said, "Hal, I've got to know, why are you here? Why are you doing seminary?" And Hal smiled and said "I've spent an entire career learning how the body works and how to heal it. But I've never learned how to do the same with someone's soul."

That one sentence has stayed with me for years.

Hal didn't need seminary. But he wanted wisdom. He could've coasted into a comfortable retirement, but instead he showed up in class, with a notebook, ready to learn, ready to grow.

James 1:5 says- "If any of you is lacking in wisdom, ask God, who gives to all generously and ungrudgingly, and it will be given you."

Hal lived that verse. He knew wisdom doesn't fall into your lap. You have to seek it. You have to put yourself in places and spaces that stretch you, in rooms where you're not the smartest person there. That takes humility. It takes curiosity. It takes showing up for an evening lecture on church history when you could be at home watching TV.

Because here's the thing: wisdom doesn't always look like knowing more. Sometimes it looks like wanting to know more. It looks like pursuing wisdom even when we don't have to. And maybe that's the lesson Hal taught me- that the moment we stop learning, the moment we stop chasing wisdom... is the moment we stop growing.

"We always say it's my job to make everyone look good," laughs Music and Worship Co-Director Shaunna Fuller, "but truly, it's our singers and musicians who make this season so extraordinary."

The choir rehearses nine Sundays from early October through the end of November, preparing nearly every piece of music for the CWE. "The choir is singing on every song this year except one!" Fuller says proudly. Music packets are handed out the first night, but many participants opt for the digital version on iPad—"a much lighter way to hold your music," she adds with a grin.

Those involved in the White's Chapel Orchestra (WCO) meet Nov. 16 for rehearsal (complete with a light lunch), followed by combined rehearsals for choir and orchestra on Dec. 7, 10, and 13—all leading up to the Christmas Worship Experience performances Dec. 13 at 5:30 p.m. and Dec. 14 at 9 and 11 a.m.

This year's theme, "Light of the World," ties together familiar hymns and fresh new arrangements. Expect to hear inspired renditions of "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" and "Silent Night," along with newer compositions such as such as "Carol Celebration" and "The Promise."

Adding even more sparkle,
Grammy-winning guitarist Mark
Lettieri returns to perform his stunning
solo "Miraculum." Featured guest
artist Amber Bullock joins a lineup of
beloved White's Chapel vocalists—Doug
Terry, Sarah and Daniel Bryson, Jacob
Garcia, Jacob Serrano, Grace Zeller,
Bruce Wermuth, Cyndi Sledge, and Ken
Nelson. Cantare will sing a pre-concert
as well as perform during the CWE,
and—as tradition requires—there will be

graceful high school dancers and those "darling baby angels" that melt every heart.

"Holly Berries"—the nickname for singers who typically enjoy participating specifically during the Christmas or Easter seasons—are an essential part of the celebration. "We so appreciate these singers," Fuller says. "After they experience the joy of making music, many decide to stay on with the choir year-round!"

The reason is simple: "So much of life is depleting—bills, appointments, endless 'have-to's," Fuller reflects. "But making music is a joy-replenisher. Body, mind, and spirit are all engaged. One of our choir members says, 'I come dragging into rehearsal and always leave with a spring in my step!"

Unlike many choirs, White's Chapel's Chancel Choir doesn't hold auditions. "This is a church choir," she emphasizes. "All are welcome—from drones to divas! We rely on the Holy Spirit to help tune our voices and blend our sound. 'Not by might, not by power, but by my Spirit,' says the Lord."

This year's CWE features an original narration written by Dr. John McKellar, tracing the thread of Jesus from Genesis to Revelation—"truly the Greatest Story Ever Told," Fuller says. Actor Ryan Brown, fresh off his starring role as Henry Higgins in "My Fair Lady," will bring the words to life as narrator.

So, whether you're a seasoned singer, an orchestra musician, or simply a fan of beautiful worship and Christmas wonder, this year's Light of the World promises to illuminate hearts and lift spirits. And it is still early enough for additional volunteers to join the magic.

As Fuller puts it: "Leave your screens and crazies behind. Come connect with our choral community—and let the music refill your joy."
