This special benefit concert will feature performances by the White's Chapel Orchestra, Choir, Cantaré, and the internationally acclaimed Vocal Majority.



While in Denver in early July competing in the Barbershop Harmony Society's International Chorus Contest—where they earned their 14th Gold Medal—the Vocal Majority received word of the unfolding tragedy in Texas. Moved by the news, the chorus felt called to act. Their first thought: a return to White's Chapel.

This collaboration carries profound meaning. In 2017, the Vocal Majority made its debut at White's Chapel in a benefit concert supporting victims of Hurricane Harvey, raising over

Volunteering is a wonderful way to jumpstart a fresh beginning. Fortunately, you will find there are numerous ways to volunteer at White's Chapel.

"The volunteer window is now open," declared Dr. Judy Hunt who oversees several of our programs that involve volunteers. "Every season brings new opportunities, new dreams and new people. In fact, Rev. Joy Roberson, Missions and Outreach Pastor, and Dorothea Christ, Involvement Director are looking forward to increasing the number of people and causes we serve and are excited to welcome new and returning volunteers."

"Over the years," Hunt said, "White's Chapel's outreach programs have evolved from the causes that our members are passionate about. As time goes on, these ministries continue and expand, but as volunteers move away or



experience life changes, new volunteers are needed. As we move into the fall, we are excited about the possibilities of involving new people in all of these ministry areas."

The **Filling the Gap** ministry reignites each fall, collecting and distributing food to households with children who are food compromised at times, such as evenings and weekends, when schools are not open.

The wonderful leaders of the **Refugee Initiative program** can always use help

in settling these newcomers into their new American homes and workplaces. The program can also use help with the English Language Learning classes that they lead each week. **Cooking with**Care (at The Ronald McDonald House) has teams that cook three times a month for families of children with cancer.

Organized church food drives continue to be used to provide support for local agencies such as Grapevine Relief



and Community Exchange (GRACE), the Presbyterian Night Shelter, Keller Community Storehouse, and the North Texas Food Bank. Volunteers are always welcome and needed for sorting, packing and delivering items to those who have food insecurities.

Kick It Right Down the Middle

read something really interesting recently. It was all about penalty kicks in soccer. Now admittedly, I'm not a huge soccer fan. But, I have always found PK's or penalty kicks fascinating. They're one of the most intense showdowns in all of sports.

It's over in about half a second, and it determines the entire outcome of a game and potentially a season. There is so much riding on one decision—where the one shooting the ball kicks it. Will they go left? Will they go right? It's a chess match. The shooter has to decide where to kick it, and the goalie has to decide which side they'll dive toward.

It all comes down to this. And really, if you're the one shooting the ball it's fair to wonder how you could miss. It seems like everything is on your side. Because the ball is placed only 12 yards away, and the goal is 8 yards wide and 8 feet high. It's a huge target.

\$42,000. A year later, in 2018, the Vocal Majority returned to join White's Chapel musicians. A stirring performance of The Battle Hymn of the Republic was recorded, a moment that still resonates deeply.

White's Chapel will feature soloist Grace Zeller singing a medley of "You'll Never Walk Alone with Climb Every Mountain," supported by WC Choir & Orchestra. Additionally, the choir will sing "Majesty and Glory of Your Name" with Cantaré offering "Gratitude."

"The WC Orchestra will feature one of my personal favorites, 'The Giving' by Michael W. Smith," said Gary Hennerberg, WC Choir Member and Vocal Majority's Director of Marketing and Customer Relations. "Vocal Majority will sing several of their most requested songs including, 'How Great Thou Art,' and our brand-new medley arrangement of 'Bridge Over Troubled Water' and *'Fire and Rain'* that we performed in our international championship win last month."

An additional significance of this run for the gold was that it was 50 years ago, in 1975, that the VM won its first Gold Medal in this contest.

"Our beloved Executive Musical Director, WC Member Jim Clancy, passed away last April. For every one of the 146 of us competing the goal to win this contest was personal. Jim had been our director for 50 years, with his son, Greg, taking over the reins in recent years."

The fund-raising efforts are in Partnership with First United Methodist Church of Kerrville. The church had purchased a campground with the intent of making it a Resource Center but is now using it to help the many who have been affected by the flooding.

Regina Guevara, a local volunteer coordinator, is running the makeshift donation site that has also been set up nearby. She held back tears as she talked about how residents are tired and sleep deprived. "Much of the help that was present in the first weeks after the flood is starting to go away," she said.

Kerrville city leaders were caught off guard by the historic weather event and an alert that warned people to head for higher ground was significantly delayed in being sent to the public, records show.

The benefit promises to be inspirational and uplifting, as voices unite to bring hope to those affected by disaster.

Admission is free, and donations will be gratefully accepted.

"With your support, we aim to surpass the impact of 2017's benefit concert—and extend meaningful relief to those in need today," said Hennerberg,

Guest speakers, singing, games, Bible stories, crafts, food trucks, and fellowship were all a part of the fun, but one breakout session was particularly special. Logan de Groot, College and Young Adult Director, along with Alec Hansen, one of our WC graphic artists and Intern Emily Cowan enjoyed conversations with senior adults about what the "good ol" days" looked like from the backseat of the family car.

trailer, just like "I love Lucy," our camper passed our car! After driving through the desert, got snowed in in Flagstaff. Car broke down so we had to take the bus home, Mom fed Yellowstone bears Oreos, dad discovered he's claustrophobic while in Carlsbad Caverns, viewed aftermath of an F5 tornado in Texas, witnessed black bears in the Smoky Mountains, while traveling with another couple, they got into an argument and refused to talk to each other the rest of the trip.

If you could take a trip over again, where would you go? Alaska, Yellowstone, Hawaii, Yosemite, anywhere with my late husband/wife, back to grandma's house, anywhere with my late mother and father, or just be with my children again.

The takeaway? Destinations are great, but true magic comes from sharing these experiences with others. And here's an interesting statistic about those kicks: goalkeepers jump left 57 percent of the time and right 41 percent, which means they stay in the center only 2 times out of 100. In other words, it's a pretty clear bet that if you shoot right down the middle you'll score. And yet, only 17 percent of kicks are aimed down the middle.

Why? How could that be? If it's statistically that much of a better shot, why wouldn't players just line it up and shoot it right down the middle every time?

Well, in their book, *Think Like a Freak*, Steven Levitt and Stephen Dunbar suggest that it's for one simple reason. It's because the goalie is standing right there in the middle, and if you shoot it right at him, and he doesn't move, you'll look like a complete fool.

In essence, it's the fear of failure and the subsequent embarrassment that comes with it, that prevents soccer players from considering a great option that would likely allow them to score. It's ironically the fear of failure that increases their chance of failing.

It reminds me of the parable of the talents from Matthew 25. A man entrusts three servants with different amounts of talents (which was a large sum of money) and they each do different things with the money. The first two servants take action with the money and in each case they double what they initially

were given. But the third servant—he's too afraid of failing. He's too afraid of messing up. So, he decides to bury the money in the dirt and wait for the master to return. And when he does—he's extremely unhappy.

It's a strange little parable situated right toward the end of Jesus' ministry. He waits until the end to share it with the disciples, and I think he did that very intentionally. He was about to be gone and he was leaving them behind with work to do. It was now up to them to take their talents, and put them to work for the kingdom of God.

He didn't want them to make the mistake of that third servant... to be so afraid of messing up that they end up standing still and doing nothing with all that God's given them. He wanted them to have the courage to put themselves out there and risk failing like the first two servants. To use what they'd been entrusted with.

And, you know what—he still wants the same from us. God doesn't want us to be like the third servant. He doesn't want us to bury what we've been given in the dirt or to be so afraid of looking foolish that we fail to take the penalty kick. He wants us to be like those first two who took the leap and tried.

So that's what we have to do. Because he has blessed every one of us, and entrusted us with talents to use. If you're reading this right now, that includes you. No exceptions. You've been entrusted with some sort of talent, some gift that is unique to you. And so it's up to us to use them.

It's up to us to line up our shot... and kick it right down the middle.

Mobile Market

The Mobile Market has evolved in its two years of active service. And what an evolution! The ministry takes food to locations in Tarrant County that are food-compromised, and lines are increasing every week as the word gets out. Each week volunteers are needed to pack the trailer and distribute food.

"The Mobile Market is trying to grow our program and take

on new Title 1 schools in Tarrant County," explained Lisa Barham, Coordinator. "In order to do that, we would love to find local corporations that would encourage their employees to partner with White's Chapel and adopt a school. The Mobile Market leadership team will work alongside the companies and teach their employees how the markets work. There are thousands of hungry families within 5–6 miles of Southlake. As a church and as a

community, we are so blessed to have the ability to help those less fortunate."

The program has fed over 50,000 people since its initial run, and "we would love to see this program continue to explode!" Barham added.

Dirty Dozen, Mary/ Martha, Angel's Attic

Several White's Chapel ministries work at ongoing yet individual projects. The **Dirty Dozen**, "offers carpentry, light plumbing, wiring and other construction skills," said Chris Rowley. "In addition to community outreach, this group has been an integral help to our church by doing some light remodeling projects on our church campus as well as at **Angels' Attic**. Most of the volunteers in the Dirty Dozen (which now exceeds three dozen men and women) are retired."

The Mary/Martha group supports some of the Dirty Dozen projects by collecting new and gently used furnishings to set up remodeled apartments for the homeless through the Home with a Heart ministry. Home With a Heart works with the Presbyterian Night Shelter, an agency that "has been guiding the journey home for the homeless in Tarrant County for 40 years!" said Martha Reukema, who is one of the Mary/Martha leaders. "Let's show them support by helping with their latest effort in providing long term stability for 144 individuals living with disabilities and exiting chronic homelessness."

The apartments are new and PNS has had clients building the furniture. "The new residents will be starting a wonderful new life journey which will be very different for them. They will need lots of our prayers to help them with making this wonderful transition and we also need to include the great leadership provided from their journey home guides."

Mary/Martha is involved in additional ministries, including the **Angel Tree**Forest at Christmas, and the ongoing
Soldier Ministry, coordinated by Bonnie

Cooper. Our soldier care ministry often needs help with packaging and mailing of goods to our men and women who are serving overseas.

"We are excited to share some upcoming Soldier Ministry opportunities for us to serve together as we continue to support our military heroes," said Cooper. "Letter writing kits are now available in the Administration Building. Feel free to pick up a kit, write a few notes, and return it at your convenience. Your heartfelt words mean a great deal to the soldiers who receive them."

The Soldier Ministry team will also be decorating and packing military boxes for the fall (Oct. 3) and for Christmas (Nov. 3) Additional information will be provided as these dates grow closer but interested volunteers may contact Cooper.





