White’s Chapel is honored to welcome APEX Arts League and members of the Dallas and Fort Worth Symphony Orchestras for an evening that redefines what the double bass can do. Presented in the intimate setting of Grace Chapel, this “Double Bass Quintet: Folk Fusion” program showcases the instrument’s remarkable depth, range, and versatility.

Often heard as the heartbeat of orchestras, jazz ensembles, and rock bands, the double bass typically keeps a low profile—supporting the melody, grounding the rhythm, and adding the rich resonance that makes every ensemble complete. But in this special concert, the instrument steps squarely into the spotlight.

Each piece on the program is mingled with folk-inspired harmonies and rhythms, drawing from both Czech and American traditions.

The performance opens with Antonín Dvořák’s String Quintet in G Major,

A shepherd’s staff, a wool fleece, a donkey’s jawbone, and a jar of perfume—what do all these seemingly ordinary items have in common? Not only does He use people, but God also prefers to use average, everyday objects to bring Himself glory and accomplish His will in a powerful display of His strength.

Since 1993, people of all ages have been gathering every holiday season to pack and send shoeboxes filled with small toys, hygiene items, and school supplies to children worldwide. The project’s vision is to reach the nations and generations by spreading the gospel.

As the holidays approach, this is a perfect way to teach children about giving.

of Jesus Christ through small favors. Often, the boxes’ recipients are affected by war, poverty, natural disasters, famine, and disease. Local churches in over 100 nations distribute these shoebox gifts during festive events where the Gospel is shared in a child-friendly manner. This year, Operation Christmas Child, in cooperation with Samaritan’s Purse, celebrates 32 years of reaching over 210 million children in more than 100 countries through gift-filled shoeboxes.

“Why shoeboxes?” you might ask. Not only are they easily accessible, recognizable, and affordable, but they also allow for easy packing, shipping, and distribution of gifts that communicate love and hope. What once was an ordinary container is now

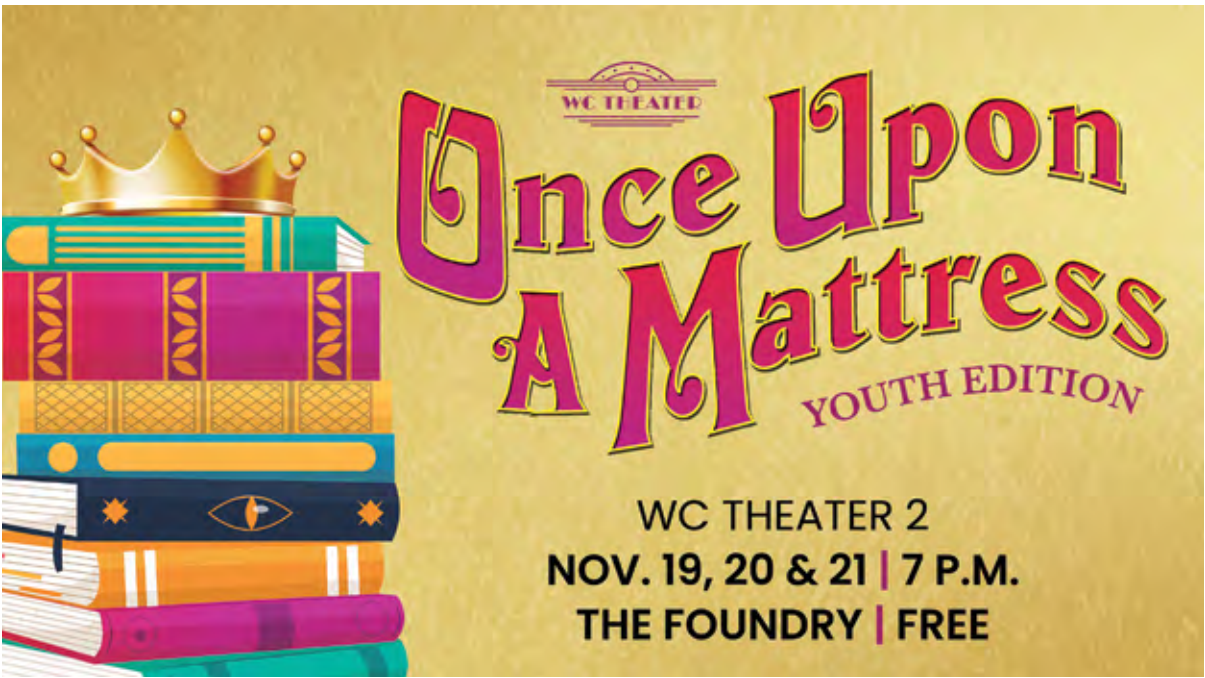

student and can’t wait for opening night.”

Joining Blalock at the helm are Eleni Brooke, Music Director; Ann-Marie Heilman, Director of Choreography; and Christian Brooke, Lighting Design. Together, this creative team has guided students through weeks of rehearsals, blending precision with playfulness to create a visually stunning performance.

Behind the scenes, a dedicated group of adult volunteers has helped transform The Foundry stage into a whimsical medieval kingdom. Blalock and Brooke designed the costumes and aesthetics, while Lee Blalock, Eleni Brooke, and Julie Blalock collaborated on the set design. Lee hand-painted the intricate stone patterns that adorn many of the backdrops, lending an authentic medieval charm.

The “A-Team” stage crew—Sam Thompson, Lee Blalock, and Zoey Heilman—repurposed old set pieces and reimaged them with new colors and textures, adding fresh vitality to the world of “Mattress.” Props were created by Julie and Eleni Brooke, and Christian Brooke’s dynamic lighting design brings depth and drama to each scene. All technical support has been provided by the WC Productions team, whose behind-the-scenes work ensures that every cue shines.

This year’s production also marks the return of Lee Blalock, who rejoined the theatre program to lend her many creative talents. “Lee has been such a valuable part of our team,” says Julie. “She’s wonderful at creating, constructing, and adding sparkle wherever it’s needed!”

White’s Chapel last presented *Once Upon a Mattress* fifteen years ago, but much has changed since then. “We have a slightly older cast this time—7th through 9th graders instead of 5th through 8th—and a larger budget, a refreshed Foundry stage, and a new director,” Blalock shares. “It’s been exciting to reimagine this classic in a fresh way.”

Op. 77, a rarely performed 19th-century treasure that places the double bass at the very heart of the ensemble—much like Schubert’s beloved Trout Quintet, “Dvořák,” who wove the spirit of his homeland into nearly every composition, and gives the bass a melodic and lyrical voice rarely heard in chamber music of his time.

Next comes Erwin Schulhoff’s “Concertino,” a bold and energetic work built on the pulse of Czech folk dance forms and complex mixed meters. Its four movements swirl with syncopation and surprise, including echoes of the lively “Furiant,” a traditional Czech dance characterized by shifting rhythms and fiery spirit.

Rounding out the evening is Edgar Meyer’s Concert “Duo,” a dazzling conversation between double bass and violin. Meyer, a modern master who moves fluidly between classical,

bluegrass, and jazz, crafts music that is both technically stunning and deeply human, rooted in the earthy traditions of American fiddle tunes and folk melodies.

Together, these works form a bridge between continents and centuries, blending European sophistication with American soul. The result is a concert that’s as intimate as it is expansive—an exploration of tone, texture, and tradition through the eyes (and strings) of the orchestra’s lowest voice.

White’s Chapel is fortunate to be one of the host venues for the APEX Arts League performances, which bring world-class musicians from the Dallas and Fort Worth Symphony Orchestras into community spaces across the Metroplex. These concerts create rare opportunities for audiences to experience exceptional artistry in a warm, welcoming setting.

transformed into a tangible symbol of God’s extraordinary love and a powerful tool that signifies the boundless reach of God’s divine power, extending even to the most remote and distant corners of the globe. His love transcends all boundaries, encompassing every height, depth, and distance. These boxes communicate to their recipients that there is nowhere in this world that God’s hand does not reach.

This November, White’s Chapel Kids will be hosting their very first Family Mission Project, where members are invited to support Operation Christmas Child. On Sunday, November 16, from 12:30 to 2 p.m. in Evans Hall, this event provides an opportunity for families to fill shoeboxes with toys and other fun items as we collaborate with Samaritan Purse’s National Collection Week, which runs from November 17 to 24 this year.

“The heart and soul of this event is to share the love and joy of Jesus through the spirit of gift-giving to children in need,” says Erin Zajac, WC Kids Family Outreach and Event Coordinator.

With a goal to pack 120 shoeboxes, families will ensure that each box is fun, full, and personalized by selecting small gifts, personalized items, and special toys to place in each box.

“Participants will get to choose the age range and gender of the child they are packing their box for,” Zajac explains. “We will have a selection of

toys and items for each age range so the participant can ‘shop’ and fill their box.”

A pizza lunch and all gift supplies will be provided. Participants should be aware that there is a \$10 registration fee per child to help cover processing and shipping costs for the shoeboxes.

“The hope is that participants will find joy in ‘shopping’ and packing their gift box, knowing that their selections will brighten the holidays for another child just like them!” Zajac exclaims. “We want this project to be relatable for children!”

Those interested in volunteering in other ways will find there are various opportunities. Day-of-event volunteers are needed to ensure the project runs smoothly. “Shopping” table volunteers can manage the donated supplies during the event, and delivery volunteers will take the finished boxes to the drop-off location the week of November 17.

As the holidays approach, this is a perfect way to teach children about giving and using their time to serve others. Additionally, this outreach event presents an opportunity to kickstart the journey of a simple shoebox. Your “yes” could be the reason a child receives a gift this Christmas.

“We are so excited to host this event for the first time for WC Kids,” shares Zajac. “I am looking forward to watching the participants make their selections and make their box with love and joy. I hope this brings families together in the spirit of serving!”

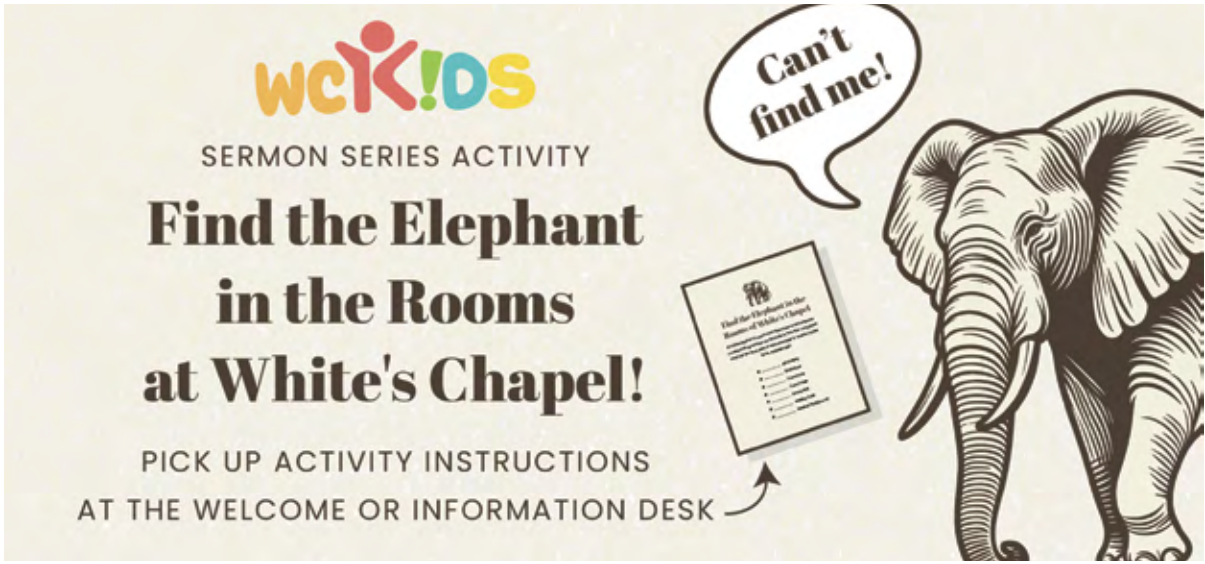

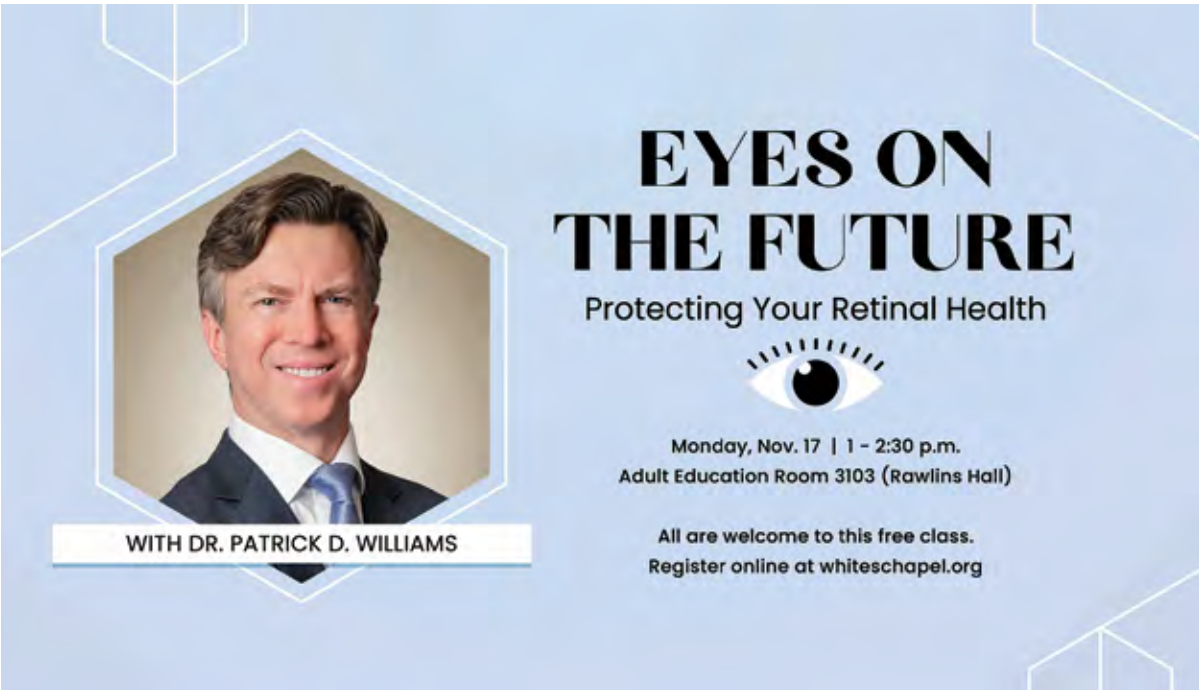
Angel Tree Forest
