Grammy Winner Sandi Patty Inaugural Artist for "WC Presents" Series

As one of the most highly acclaimed performers of our time, Sandi Patty has garnered five Grammy awards, four Billboard Music Awards, three platinum records, five gold records, over 40 Dove awards, and more than 12 million units sold. She has been inducted into the Gospel Music Hall of Fame as well as the Oklahoma Hall of Fame—and she is coming to White's Chapel on Thursday, Oct. 12.

The performance is the first engagement of the "White's Chapel Presents" series, according to Dr. Arnold Rawls, Artist in Residence.

"I remember as a student at Oklahoma Baptist University several of us going to Oklahoma City to attend my first Sandi Patty concert," said Rawls. "It was NOT a performance but an evening of worship. It is my hope and prayer that we have the same experience here at White's Chapel."

The evening will be treated as a worship service. No tickets or reservations are necessary. The doors will open at 6 p.m.; People will be seated as they arrive.

Known as "The Voice," Sandi Patty was originally introduced to the world with her rendition of "The Star-Spangled Banner" during the rededication of the Statue of Liberty in 1986, virtually overnight becoming one of the country's

WC Men Continue Partnership with Blueprint Ministries

WC Men's Ministry will once again work with Blueprint Ministries to assist the people of San Antonio, Texas by making their homes safer places to live. Those interested in serving the community are still able to sign up for the upcoming Men's Mission Trip this October.

Blueprint Ministries is a nonprofit organization in the heart of San Antonio that provides servant leadership training for youth and adults. Volunteers work to

restore homes for elderly, disabled and low-income residents. Homeowners approved for repairs must meet various standards such as falling below or near federal poverty level and living inside the 410 Loop of San Antonio. The projects range from roofing and drywall repair, to sub flooring installation and painting. The overall goal is to make homes safer, warmer and drier for residents.

Both WC Men and Women have worked with Blueprint Ministries in the past to serve the people of San Antonio. Despite a brief hiatus in 2020, WC Men have served the residents of San Antonio each year since 2011. Because of their efforts, they have impacted the lives of many homeowners and improved the state of their homes.



"The main goal is to provide an opportunity for the men of White's Chapel to put our faith into practice," said Rev. Jon Reeves, Men's Ministry Pastor. "We help people who can't help themselves. As a result of doing this together, we grow in our faith in Christ and in our friendships with one another."

While much of the work is construction related, participants don't need any prior skills, experience, or personal tools to participate.

"All tools and materials will be provided by Blueprint," said Reeves. "We also have several professional or highly-experienced construction guys on the trip, so it is a great learning experience

I know it sounds bizarre, but I feel a little bit cheated. As I sit to write this, the air is sizzling and the thermometer is sitting still at a mocking 104 degrees (by the way, welcome to fall in Texas to all our friends who've recently moved to the area)! They tell us that this has been one of the hottest summers in recorded history. In fact, last month was the second hottest August we've ever experienced (we missed the record by a scant four-tenths of one degree). We endured all those scalding days, all those searing temperatures, and for what? Second place.

So close, now so far away. And I think that can be said for much of our lives. We get so close to what we want, so close to what we work and sacrifice for, so close to our dreams... but something inevitably happens, and we fall just short of success (whatever that is).

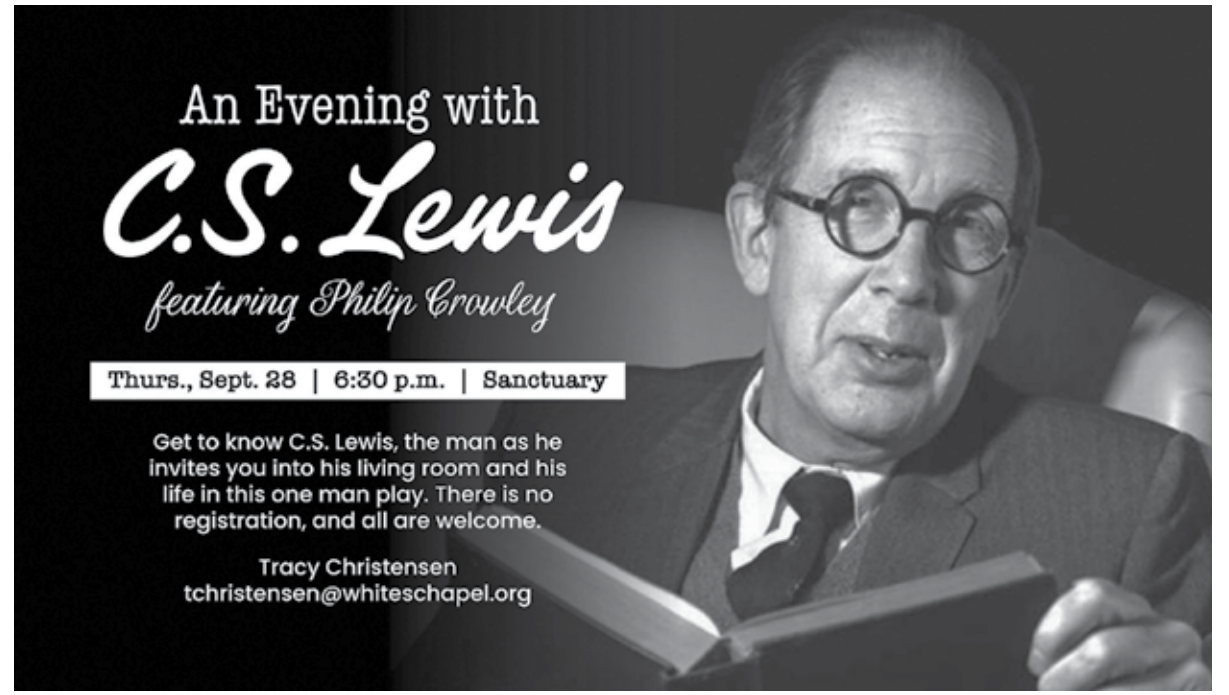
When faced with this stark reality of the way life all too often works, we have a choice. We can give up and bathe in defeat; we can walk away mad and dejected, we can give up. Or, we can re-group, re-frame, and re-dream!

Open the Bible to any page, and there you see it: men and women who are faced with this exact same choice. Some walk away. But others—those we hold in the highest regard as heroes—dig deep and rededicate their lives to a higher

calling. We celebrate them, not because of their initial success, but because they rose from ashes of what seemed like defeat. Moses faced Pharaoh. Rahab saved the spies. Daniel emerged from the lions' den. Jesus rose from the dead.

Here's a name for us: Barsabbas (also known as Justus). Don't recognize either of those names? It's not surprising. Barsabbas was the runner-up in the election of a lifetime. After the death of Judas, the disciples gathered to fill the open spot within the twelve. Two candidates were on the slate: Barsabbas and Matthias (interestingly, my computer recognizes his name—there's no squiggly red line). Matthias was elected, and Barsabbas' name was lost to obscurity... but that's not to say that he gave up. In fact, we never hear of Matthias in the New Testament again, but look close and you will see Barsabbas there making cameo appearances as Justus. More than that, tradition tells us that Barsabbas/Justus went on to be a bishop in the early Church and gave his life as a martyr for the gospel.

So, on those days when we feel like the runners up, when we feel like the "also ran's", when we feel like I did on elementary Field Day with my yellow "Honorable Mention" ribbon, let us choose to be a people braised and tried by the heat of life to emerge as tempered and purified gold; let us emerge with lives honed to be spent in the service of our Savior!

The Voice

John and I had just married and were living in Shreveport, Louisiana in the early '80s. At the time, we were attending First United Methodist Church of Shreveport and had the most wonderful Sunday School class I had ever been a part of. As so many Sunday School classes do, our class became a big part of our social lives; we enjoyed great fellowship, dinners, events, and wonderful memories.

One of the fondest memories I have was attending a Gaither concert in Shreveport's Municipal auditorium. My aunt and uncle came over from Tyler to join us, making it really special. The Auditorium wasn't a huge venue as we are accustomed to here in the Dallas-Fort Worth area: but what we were used to at that time: One could actually see the people on the stage! The Gaithers were exceptionally popular in the Christian music genre. Many of the songs that Bill and Gloria Gaither had written had been recorded and had become widely known. Their musical "Alleluia" had also been popular in many of the churches in the Shreveport-Bossier area. We were very excited to go to listen and see the concert.

The Gaithers and their company performed all the familiar Christian musical numbers that we had grown to love—"Something Beautiful," "There's Something About That Name," "The King is Coming," "Because He Lives"—and we enjoyed every moment. But as the concert began to close, the lights went down and the venue grew dark, one solitary light shone down on a woman, alone and center stage. She began singing the words—and signing as she sang... "The sky shall unfold preparing His entrance...the stars shall applaud in thundering praise..."

The strings came up quietly in the background as the artist painted the picture of what it will be like when Christ returns. By the time the song was over, no one was seated; I was weeping, John was weeping, and I don't think there was a dry eye in the house. It was one of those WOW moments. The Holy Spirit had blessed the concert and the audience was mesmerized by—not only the words and the story of the song—but the music, the signing of the words, and the voice that delivered it.

This voice I had never heard before

and would never forget was the voice of Sandi Patty.

That night I became a huge follower of Sandi's music. We purchased her first CD and every CD that came out afterwards. I memorized the words to all of the songs and delighted in the stories and sermons that they preached. She became known in Christian circles as The Voice, and was often compared to another magnificent voice of that day, Barbra Streisand. (There was no greater compliment in the music world at that time.)

It did not surprise me in the least to learn that when President Ronald Reagan heard Sandi Patty singing "The Star-Spangled Banner" he invited her to headline the annually televised Christmas in Washington in 1986 and perform in the "We the People 200: Constitutional Gala," a 4th of July celebration in 1987.

Sandi's music was extremely influential in my own personal life. It was a go to when I was down and out or when I yearned to be spiritually uplifted. Her music was also influential when we first moved to Southlake in 1992 because many of the songs she had recorded had become available as simple choral arrangements as well as excellent material for some of the solos sung in the first few years we were here. Her music was some of the most important contemporary Christian music of the day.

When John and I took a trip to Israel with a large church group in 2017, I experienced one of those magic moments: I was walking with a friend in Jerusalem down the Via Delarosa... the road to Calvary... reliving the walk Jesus took bearing the cross. We were talking about the song regaling that walk and how we wished we could hear it as we walked down that road. Suddenly it dawned on me that we live in a digital age! I went to my phone and downloaded it on iTunes. There was Sandi, singing her famous recording of that fateful story.

Both of my children grew up listening to Sandi's music, and I think both of them learned to appreciate Christian music through Sandi Patty. (When I told Jay she was coming to White's Chapel he was almost as excited as I am.)

Many new contemporary Christian artists have evolved since the 80s and the styles of their songs have changed with the times. But for me, Christian music will always start with Sandi Patty.

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for guys with no or less experience. Also, the range of tasks varies greatly, so there is plenty of work to be done for anyone with just a willing heart."

Men are able to choose between a two-day and a three-day trip. The tree-day option, where travelers head to San Antonio on Wednesday, Oct. 18 and return Sunday, Oct. 22, is available for \$285. The standard two-day trip, allowing travelers to leave Thursday, Oct. 19 and return Sunday, Oct. 22, is \$245. The cost includes 3/4 nights of lodging, 3/4 breakfasts, 2/3 lunches, 1 dinner, 2/3 days of mission work, and a shirt. Everyone will stay at the Blueprint Ministries facility, which sleeps 136 people in bunk beds and includes a fully-equipped kitchen, 19 individual showers, a recreational room, and a dining hall. Participants are encouraged to bring work shoes, sunglasses and sunscreen, a Bible, bedding and a pillow, a towel and washcloth, toiletries, casual and work clothes, and a water bottle. Money for additional meals or snacks is also recommended.

While the focus of the trip is centered around serving the community and completing home repairs, the fellowship among volunteers is also a highlight of the mission trip experience.

"This trip provides guys with the opportunity to get to know other men in the church," Reeves said. "We work alongside each other. We eat with each other. And we also spend free time in the evening talking and playing dominoes. Guys always come back home with new friends."

Reeves believes this trip not only helps provide hope and security to the people of San Antonio, but it also provides a great opportunity for volunteers to encounter God in new ways.

"On the spiritual side, there's nothing like getting out of our normal routines away from home for a couple of days," he said. "That gives us a chance to stop worrying about the day-to-day and have



a chance to focus deeply on what God is showing us."

Men 18 years old and older are welcome to attend the upcoming trip. No experience is necessary, just a willing heart. The registration link for the WC Men's Mission Trip is available on the [church website](#). The deadline to register is Sunday, Oct. 6.

in relationships or dealing with other problems. They call themselves the "Diamond Dogs." If one of the men has a problem, they call all the men into Ted Lasso's office and begin their meeting, with some howling before sharing their issues.

This show illustrates in a gentle and lighthearted way what is needed for men today. A safe place to talk and be accepted. Men need to know they are not alone.

According to Mental Health America, six million men are affected by depression. Men are less likely than women to seek help for depression, substance abuse, and stressful life events due to social norms, downplaying symptoms, and a reluctance to talk.

Creating safe spaces for men to find support has many benefits. A 2003 study published in the Journal of Men's Studies illustrated the ways in which men's support groups in Western Australia benefited them. The results showed that social and emotional support is developed through membership in men's groups. The value of personal

story telling and expressing emotions for identity change was found. The need to be expressive and self-disclose was strongly reflected across interviews and viewed by participants as a positive, cathartic experience. The findings showed that these men had learned new ways of relating to other men and seeing themselves.

This September, Rev. Victor Resendez will be offering a group for men on Male Spirituality. To learn more and register, visit whiteschapel.org. In addition, there will be additional opportunities for men to get together to discuss their faith and receive emotional support from other men. Resendez hopes to create a safe place for men at White's Chapel.
